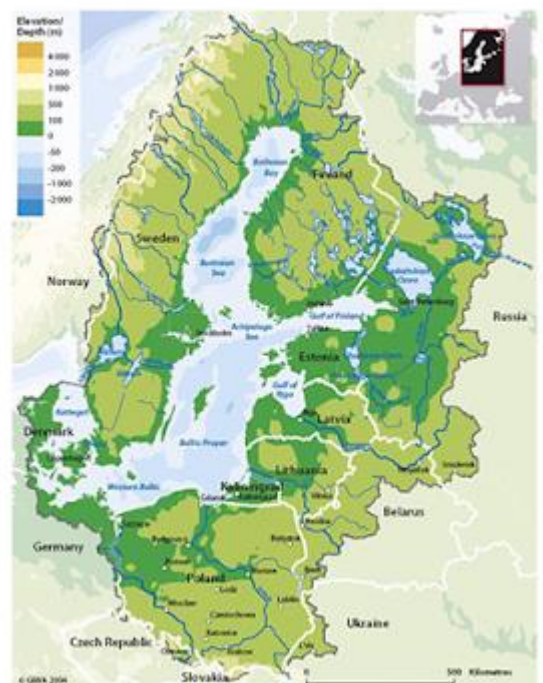
Goal of the webinar
